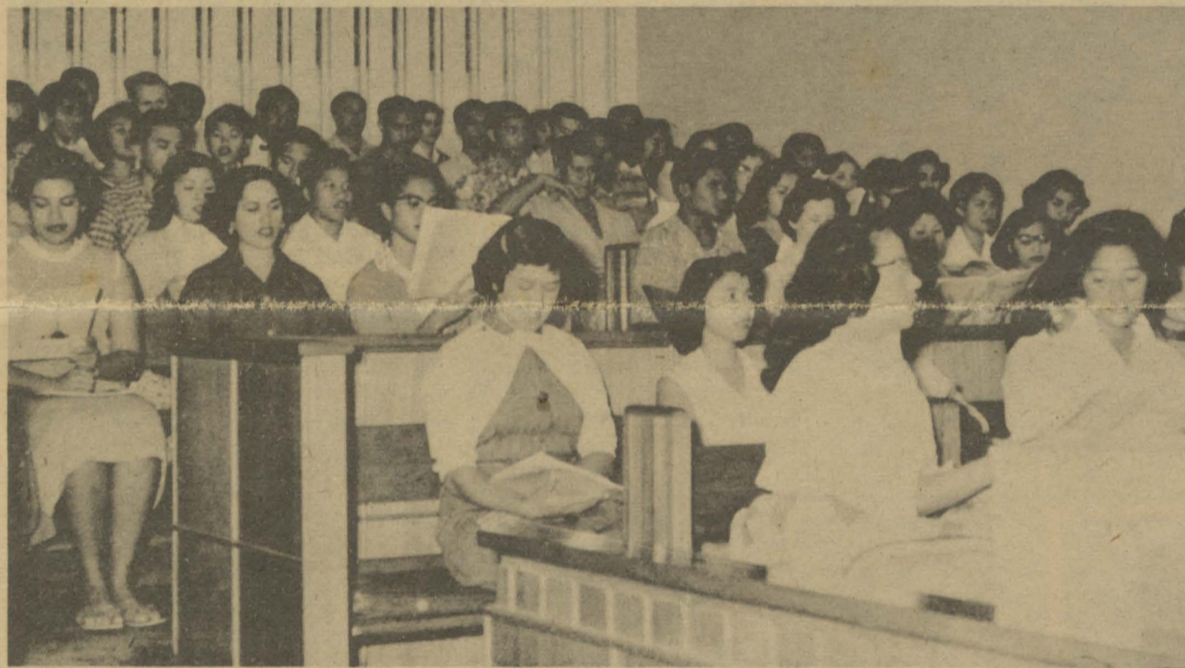


## Xmas Program Features Choir

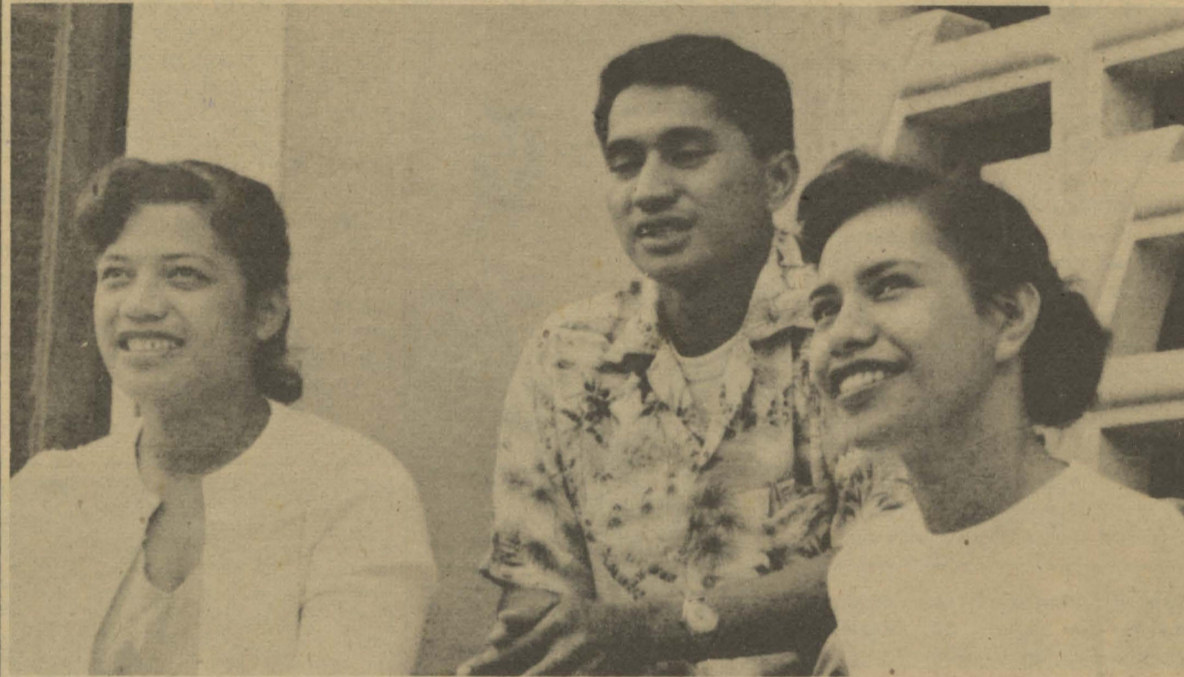
Laie enjoyed a Christmas program presented Wednesday night in the chapel of the Laie Wards by the Church College Departments of Art, Language Arts, and Music.

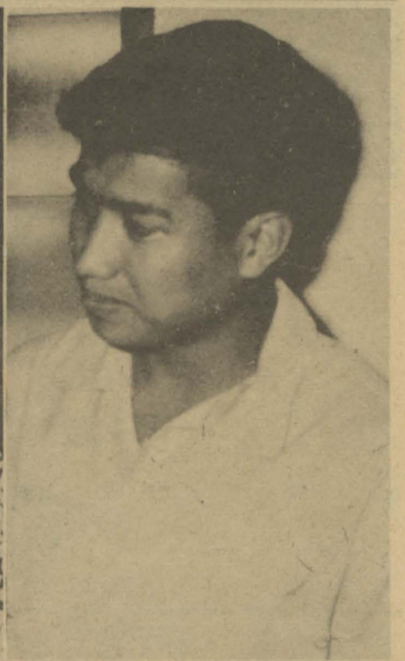
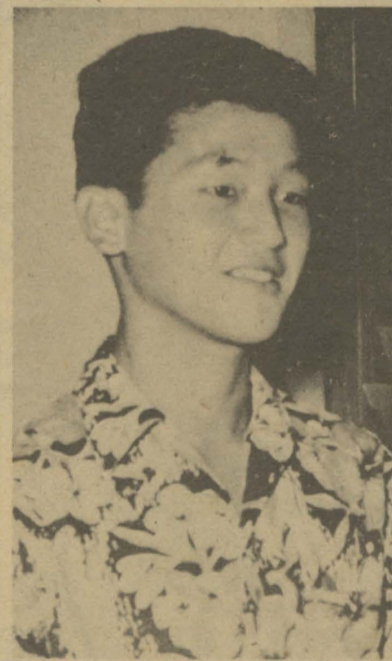
## CCH Student Dies In Honolulu

Those who tried out for the pep squad were Lenore Alabab, Thelma Kau, Verna Mae Ho, Miriam Hanohano, Thelma Hi-

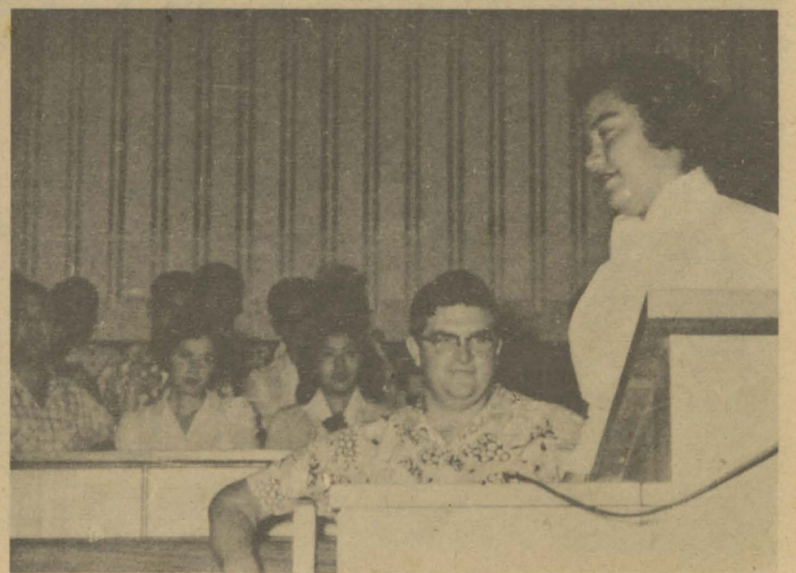

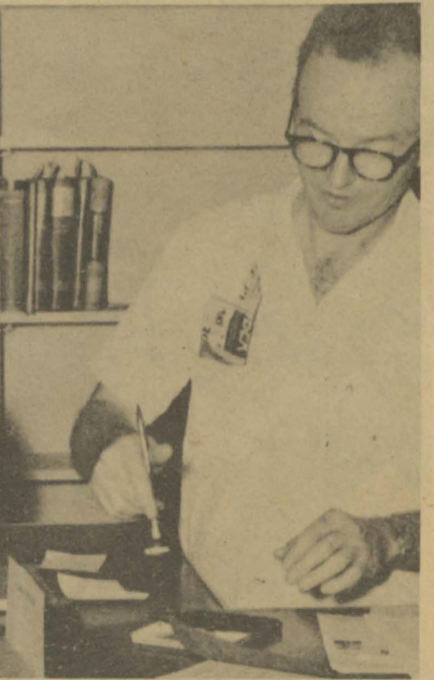

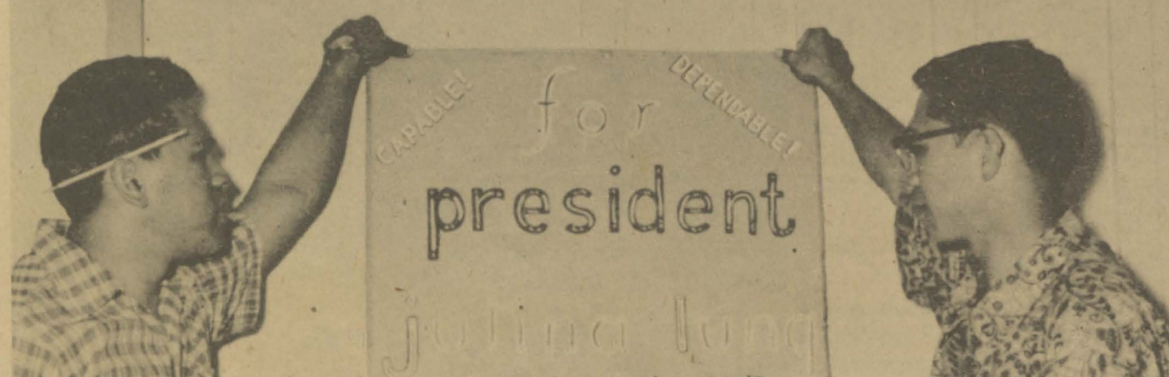

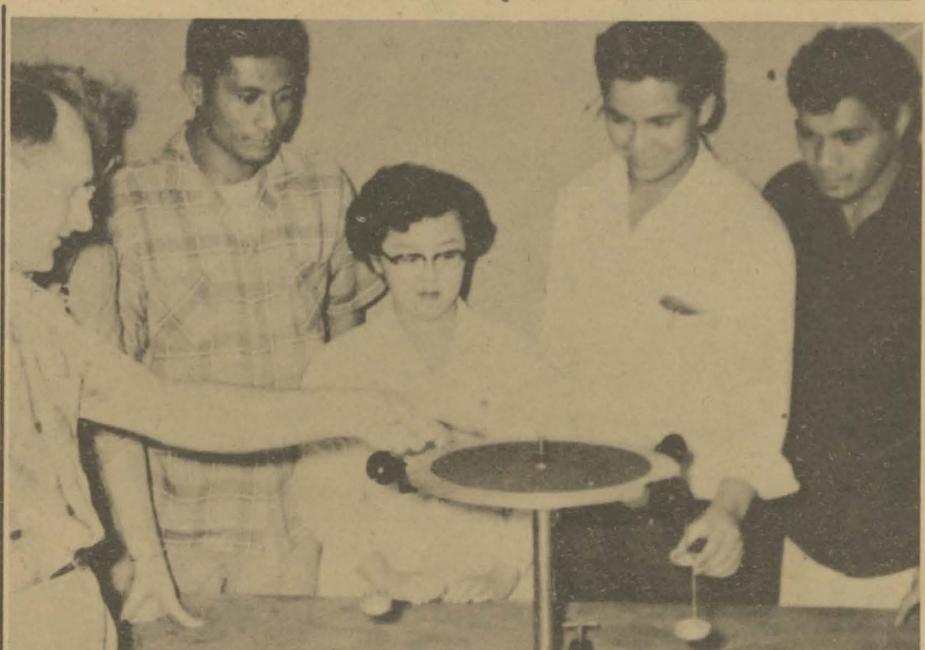
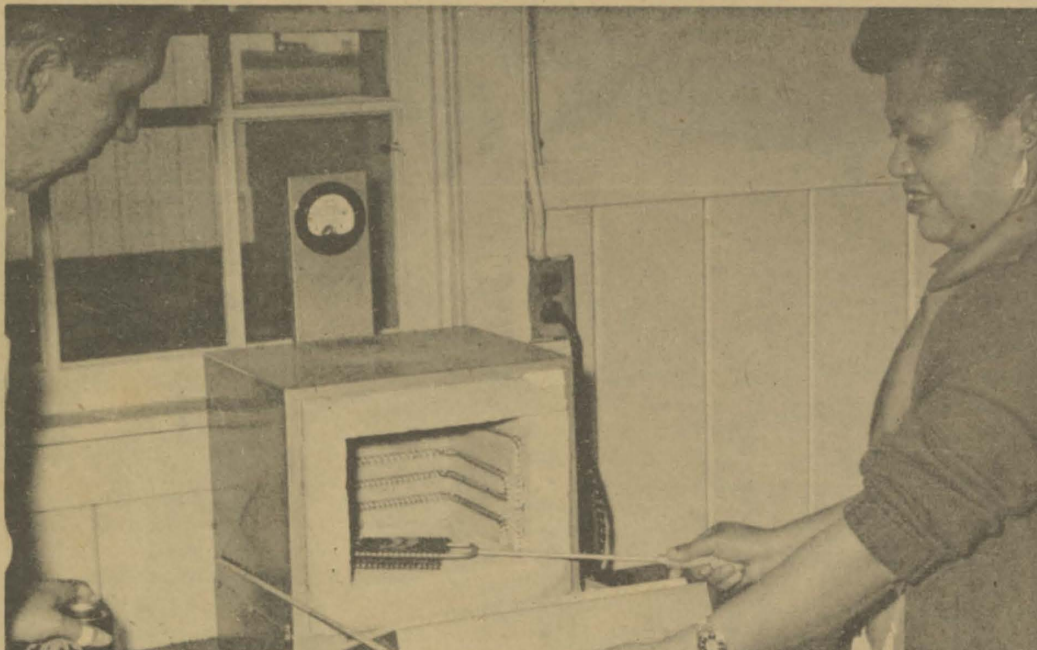

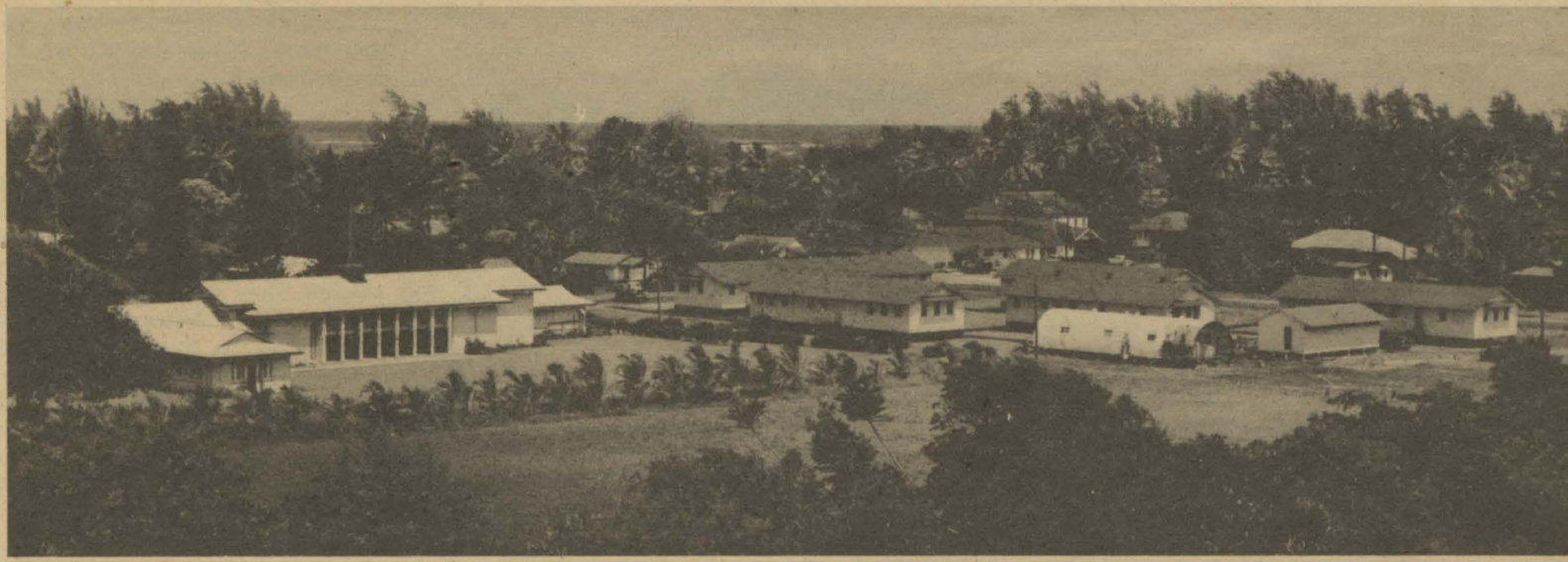

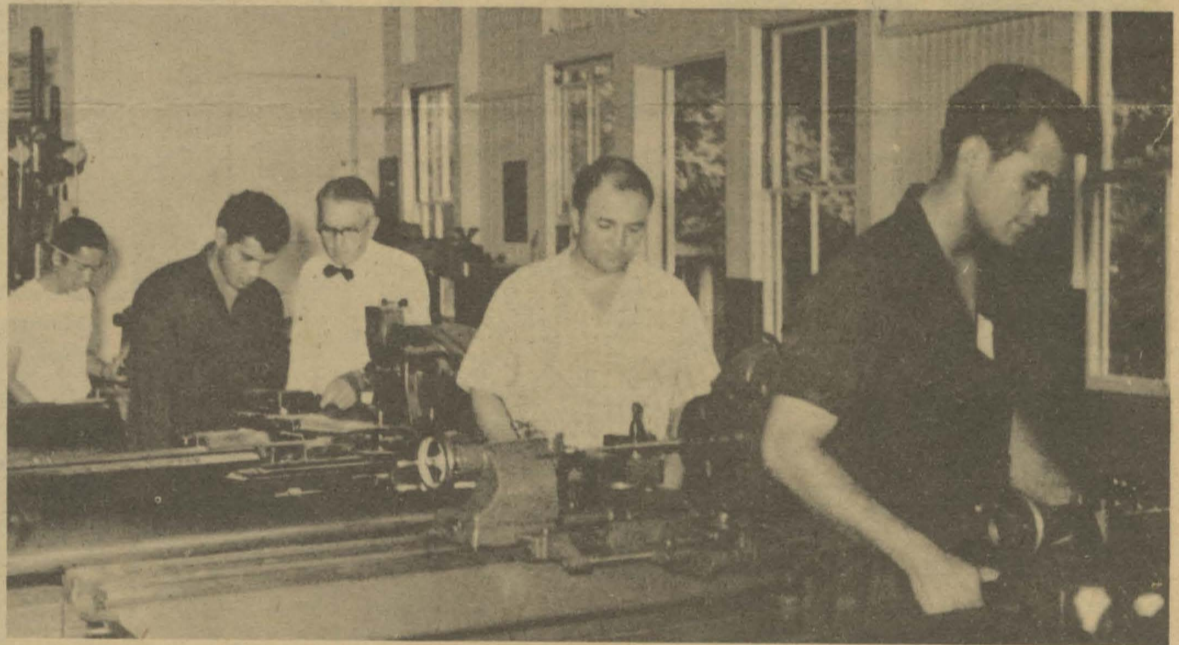
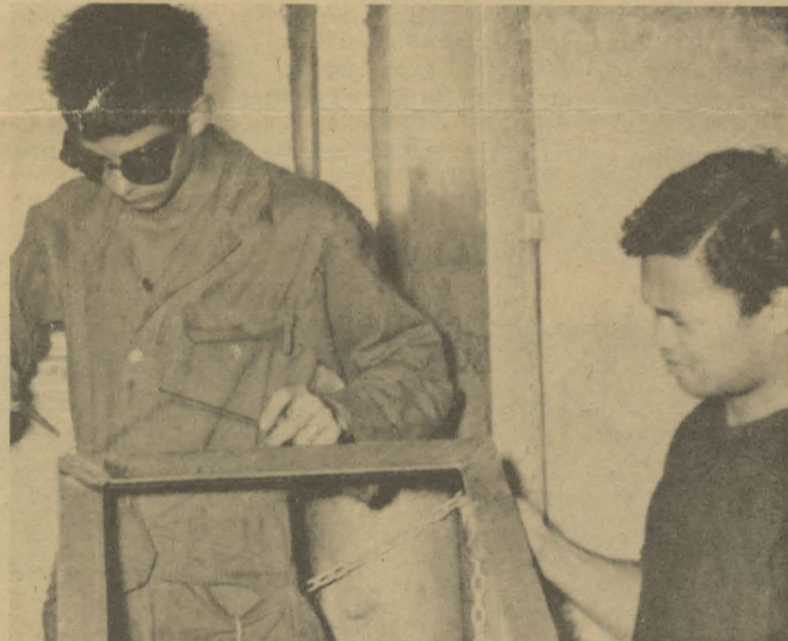

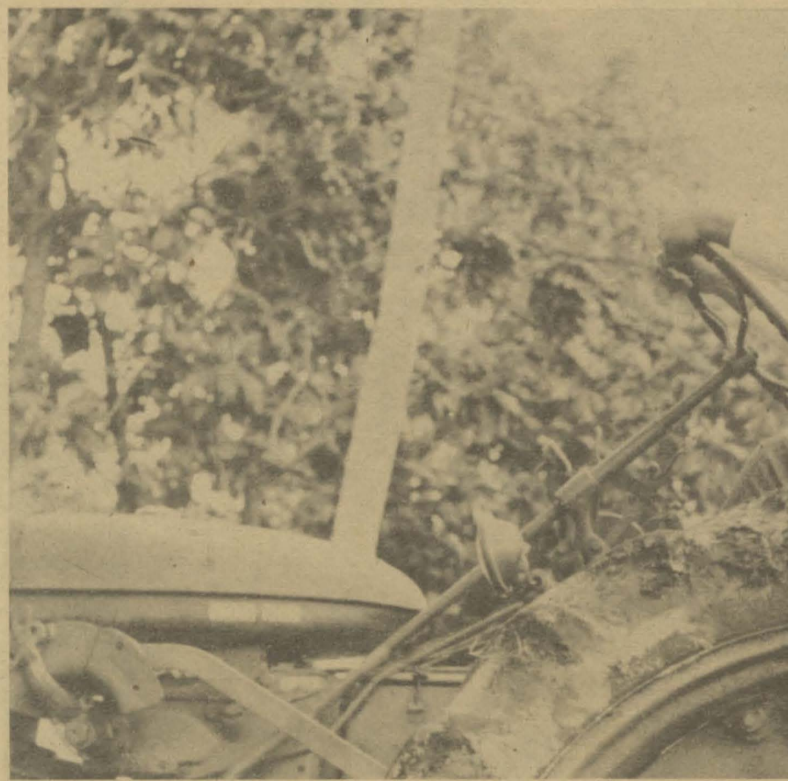
