President Law returned from his three-week Mainland trip on April 14. During his trip, he interviewed and investigated prospective teachers for the College, conducted school business and attended General Conference in Salt Lake City. He visited El Camino College, University of Southern California, University of California, Los Angeles City College and Los Angeles State in Los Angeles, California. In Utah he visited the State Department of Education, various school districts, Brigham Young University, the University of Utah, Weber College, and Utah State University, formerly Utah State Agriculture College. He also talked with the presidents of Carbon, Snow, Dixie and Ricks College. Dr. Richard T. Wootton was left in charge of the College during President Law's absence.

Four new faculty members have been recommended to and approved by the Board of Trustees. Albert Lolotai of Redondo Beach, California, formerly of Laie, will be the coach and men's physical education teacher. He attended the University of Hawaii, received his Bachelor's Degree and did graduate work at Colorado A. and M. He has performed in professional football and wrestling and is widely known in Hawaii for his athletic ability.

Barbara Gae Christensen of Salt Lake City, and Richfield, Utah, will be the new home economics teacher. She is a graduate of the University of Utah, and has done graduate work there.
